Management Policies

The core management philosophy of the SOFTBANK Group (hereafter "the Group") is "Endeavoring to benefit society and the economy by fostering the sharing of wisdom and knowledge gained through the IT revolution." By conducting business activities in a creative manner, the Group focuses its energy on both contributing to the development of society and increasing its corporate value.

The household penetration rate of broadband connections in Japan is already more than 30%, bringing the country closer to the full-fledged advent of the ubiquitous information age and making broadband an integral element of infrastructures for daily activities. SOFTBANK CORP. (hereafter "the Company") is concentrating on developing Japan's broadband market with the aim for becoming a lifestyle company that can provide broadband for every aspect of people's lives. The cumulative number of lines installed in the Group's *Yahoo! BB* comprehensive broadband service exceeded 4.28 million at the end of June 2004, enabling the Group to retain its leading position in the ADSL service market among Japan's communications carriers and ISPs. The Group also continues to hold an overwhelming lead in the IP telephony market, where the cumulative lines installed of its *BB Phone* IP telephone service rose to 4.03 million at the end of June 2004 (based on Company data).

As part of its strategy to translate its comprehensive broadband strategy into action, the Company in July 2004 acquired 100% of the issued and outstanding common stock of JAPAN TELECOM CO., LTD. Through this acquisition, the Group has raised the number of lines installed for individual and corporate customers to approximately 10 million and raised annual consolidated net sales to approximately ¥1 trillion. In addition to enlarging the scale of operations, this acquisition is producing synergies between the Group's operations which are strong in the consumer market, and the operations of JAPAN TELECOM CO., LTD. which are strong in the corporate market.

The medium- and long-term management strategies are to generate stable earnings and cash flows by making the broadband infrastructure business more profitable, and to strengthen attractive content in a manner that draws on synergies among Group companies by utilizing the broadband infrastructure business as a platform. As its customer base grows, the Group will offer more value-added services with an increase of ARPU (Average Revenue Per User) and profit margins by utilizing its full-IP network, one of the largest in the world. Regarding growth in the number of customers, the target is to raise the cumulative number of lines installed of *Yahoo! BB* to more than 6 million by the end of September 2005. In the broadband business domain, the aim is to create new profit opportunities by not limiting activities to ADSL, offering services that are best suited to current trends in technological progress, cost efficiency, market conditions and other areas. At Internet-based Group companies, the Group will raise its overall profitability by strengthening operations in the content domain; the *BBTV* service over the ADSL network at BB Cable Corporation, the Internet auction and shopping businesses at Yahoo Japan Corporation and others. Regarding specific earnings targets, the Group is aiming to achieve a monthly operating surplus during the current fiscal year.

Important management issues are achieving profitability in the broadband infrastructure business at an early stage, diversifying fund procurement methods and bolstering the management system for information security. To continuously meet the demand for funds in the broadband infrastructure business and other areas, the Group continues to secure a variety of means for procuring funds. To increase corporate value, the Group is managing its finances so as to achieve the optimal composition of capitalization. Regarding the information security management system, countermeasures consisting of 649 items have already been taken involving the protection of customer information. The Group continues to maintain the highest level of information security management system and is working as one to protect all of its information resources.

Results of Operations and Financial Position

1. Consolidated Results of Operations

<Overview of First Quarter Results>

In the first quarter ended June 30, 2004, net sales increased \(\frac{4}{4}\)3,429 million, or 42%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to \(\frac{4}{147}\),311 million. Steady growth in Broadband Infrastructure segment sales continued along with the increase in the number of paying customers in the *Yahoo! BB* service. In addition, net sales increased in the Internet Culture and e-Finance segments.

The operating loss decreased \(\frac{\text{\$\text{\$\text{\$\genty}}}}{20,378}\) million to \(\frac{\text{\$\text{\$\text{\$\genty}}}}{3.819}\) million compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year. There was a continued improvement in the operating loss in the Broadband Infrastructure segment because of the increase in net sales and other factors. In addition, aggregate operating income for all segments other than Broadband Infrastructure continued to grow, with an increase of \(\frac{\text{\$\text{\$\genty}}}{9,826}\) million, or 209%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to \(\frac{\text{\$\genty}}{14,518}\) million.

There was a decrease of ¥18,964 million in the ordinary loss to ¥11,669 million compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year. Net equity in loss under the equity-method was ¥2,295 million compared to net equity in gain under the equity-method of ¥880 million recorded in the same quarter of the previous fiscal year, because Aozora Bank, Ltd. is no longer accounted for using the equity method due to the sale of all shares held in Aozora Bank, Ltd. There was an exchange loss of ¥1,696 million due to the yen's depreciation compared with a gain of ¥364 million in the same quarter of the previous fiscal year. Interest expense increased ¥2,232 million to ¥5,000 million compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year because of the increase in interest-bearing debts. Due to these factors, net non-operating expenses were ¥7,849 million, ¥1,414 million more than the same quarter of the previous fiscal year.

The net loss decreased \$16,858 million to \$17,876 million compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year. Net special income increased \$1,703 million to \$7,398 million compared with the same quarter of the previous fiscal year. This includes an aggregate gain of \$6,302 million on the sale of investment securities such as shares held in E*TRADE SECURITIES CO., LTD. and M.P. Technologies, Inc.

<First Quarter Results by Business Segment>

Broadband Infrastructure—Segment sales increased ¥22,366 million, or 94%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥46,175 million. There was steady growth in the number of paying customers in the *Yahoo! BB* service as the service maintained low monthly churn rate of between 1% and 2%. Furthermore, there was an increase in the share of customers using value-added services such as more high-speed services and wireless LAN. These factors contributed to growth in net sales at SOFTBANK BB Corp. and ISP revenue at Yahoo Japan Corporation. The segment had an operating loss of ¥18,337 million mainly due to continuing customer acquisition costs. However, there was growth in the number of paying customers and ARPU. Furthermore, fixed costs have remained almost constant level as net sales have increased. Due to these factors, there was a large decrease of ¥10,552 million in the operating loss compared with the same quarter of the previous fiscal year.

e-Commerce—Segment sales increased ¥1,725 million, or 3%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥58,035 million. Operating income increased ¥895 million, or 139%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥1,540 million. At SOFTBANK BB Corp., strong sales of highly profitable security-related software underpinned sales of mainstay software distribution. There was an improvement in the operating margin due to measures to raise efficiency, such as a redeployment of employees to the broadband infrastructure business and a review of distribution systems.

e-Finance—Segment revenue increased \(\frac{\pmax}{8}\),897 million, or 127%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to \(\frac{\pmax}{15}\),906 million and operating income increased \(\frac{\pmax}{3}\),523 million, or 787%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to \(\frac{\pmax}{3}\),970 million. A major source of revenue growth was the acquisition of a controlling stake in WORLD NICHIEI Securities Co., Ltd.* Other factors were significant increases in brokerage commission revenue and financial income from interest and dividends at E*TRADE SECURITIES CO., LTD. due to the higher trading volume in Japan's active stock markets. In the first quarter, this segment recorded a \(\frac{\pmax}{2}\),534 million gain on sale of investment securities as special income resulting from the partial sale of shares held in E*TRADE SECURITIES CO., LTD.

*WORLD NICHIEI Securities Co., Ltd. and SOFTBANK FRONTIER SECURITIES CO., LTD. merged in February 2004 to form WORLD NICHIEI FRONTIER Securities Co., Ltd.

Media & Marketing—Segment sales decreased ¥577 million, or 16%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥3,021 million and the operating loss increased ¥108 million to ¥327 million compared with the same quarter of the previous fiscal year. This performance mainly reflects lower sales of magazines and books at SOFTBANK Publishing Inc. amid a prolonged slump in the IT publishing market. In the first quarter, this segment recorded a ¥2,040 million gain on sale of investment securities as special income resulting from the partial sale of shares held in M.P. Technologies, Inc.

Broadmedia—Segment sales decreased ¥47 million, or 2%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥3,077 million. The operating loss increased ¥88 million to ¥838 million compared with the same quarter of the previous fiscal year. This was due mainly to depreciation expenses, leasing fees, development-related expenses, and other expenses incurred by a marketing campaign at BB Cable Corporation which operates the *BBTV* service via the ADSL network under which basic monthly fees and some other fees were waived.

Internet Culture—Segment sales increased ¥7,904 million, or 60%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥21,070 million and operating income increased ¥4,455 million, or 67%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥11,103 million. Steady growth continued at Yahoo Japan Corporation as this company executed a business strategy that leverages the Yahoo brand, which is being backed by the collective activities of all global Yahoo group companies. Making a particularly large contribution to sales growth in the first quarter was an increase in the sales of information listings due to the start of *Yahoo! RIKUNABI*, a recruiting information site offered through a tie-up with RECRUIT CO., LTD. Growth in advertising sales also continued.

Technology Services—Segment sales increased ¥1,434 million, or 35%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥5,541 million. This was mainly due to an increase in sales relating to the backoffice service on e-commerce sites, network system design, construction, operation and maintenance services, security equipment and other products of SOFTBANK TECHNOLOGY CORP. Along with the increase in sales, operating income increased ¥113 million, or 238%, compared with the first quarter of the previous fiscal year, to ¥160 million.

2. Financial Position

<Balance Sheet Analysis (comparison with the end of fiscal 2004)>

Total assets increased ¥246,097 million to ¥1,667,303 million. The main reasons were a ¥45,390 million increase in cash and deposits and a ¥73,305 million increase in cash segregated as deposits related to securities business and receivables related to margin transactions mainly at E*TRADE SECURITIES CO., LTD. and WORLD NICHIEI FRONTIER Securities Co., Ltd. Investment securities increased ¥81,833 million because of an increase in the market value of shares held in Yahoo! Inc. and others.

Total liabilities increased ¥243,335 million to ¥1,333,673 million. There was a ¥74,144 million increase in payables related to margin transactions and guarantee deposits received from customers related to securities business mainly at E*TRADE SECURITIES CO., LTD. and WORLD NICHIEI FRONTIER Securities Co., Ltd. In addition, there was an increase of ¥20,872 million in bonds mainly due to the issuance of convertible bonds by SOFTBANK INVESTMENT CORPORATION. There was an increase of ¥61,261 million in cash receipt as collateral under security deposit agreements in other current liabilities and a ¥66,242 million increase in derivative liabilities associated with derivative transactions utilizing Yahoo! Inc. stock in other long-term liabilities.

Shareholders' equity decreased ¥7,435 million to ¥230,645 million. The increase in the market value of Yahoo! Inc. stock and other investments raised net unrealized gain on other securities by ¥53,339 million while there was a ¥43,521 million increase in net unrealized loss on derivative instruments based on market value. In addition, accumulated deficits increased ¥20,474 million mainly due to the net loss.

<Cash Flow Analysis>

There were positive cash flows of \$67,291 million in the first quarter as cash was provided by financing activities while cash was used in operating and investing activities. As a result, there was a net increase of \$67,262 million in cash and cash equivalents to \$504,395 million compared with the previous fiscal year end.

Net cash used in operating activities was ¥11,937 million. Loss before income taxes and minority interest was ¥4,271 million, mostly resulting from the operating loss in the Broadband Infrastructure segment. In addition, income taxes paid at Yahoo Japan Corporation and certain other companies were ¥19,663 million. Depreciation and amortization was ¥9,850 million.

Net cash used in investing activities was ¥23,301 million. Cash of ¥16,762 million was used for the purchase of property and equipment and intangibles, mainly transmission equipment at SOFTBANK BB Corp.

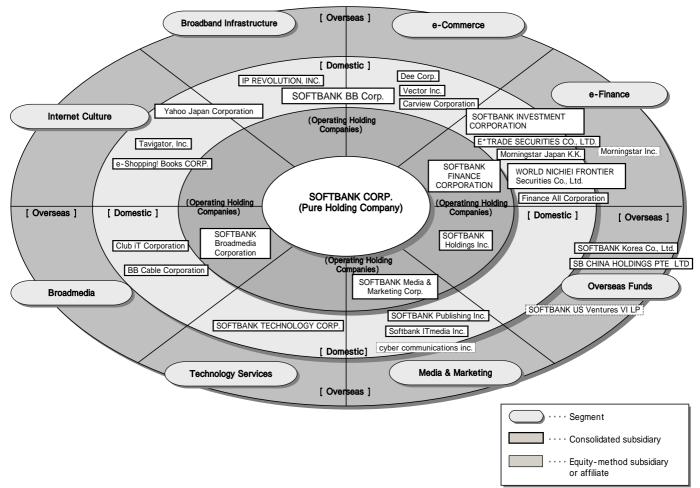
Net cash provided by financing activities was ¥98,752 million. The major components were ¥62,853 million in proceeds from security deposit agreements which is included in the "others, net" item, and ¥19,995 million in proceeds from the issuance of convertible bonds by SOFTBANK INVESTMENT CORPORATION.

The translation of revenues and expenses in the financial statements of foreign consolidated subsidiaries into Japanese yen is performed by using the average exchange rate for the period. Assets and liabilities are translated using the foreign exchange rates prevailing at the balance sheet dates, and capital stock is translated using the historical rates. Foreign currency financial statement translation differences are presented as a separate component of "Shareholders' equity", except for the portion pertaining to minority shareholders, which is included in "Minority interest in consolidated subsidiaries".

[5] Capital lease

Under the Japanese accounting standards, capital leases, as defined therein, other than those whereby the ownership of the assets is transferred to the lessee at the end of the lease term, are permitted to be accounted for as operating leases with a footnote disclosure of the estimated acquisition cost, estimated accumulated depreciation and future lease payments or receipts.

[6] Accounting for significant hedge transactions

(1) Hedge accounting

Unrealized gains and losses, net of tax, on derivative instruments that are qualified as an effective cash flow hedge at a consolidated subsidiary in the United States of America are reported as a separate component of "Shareholders' equity" in the Company's consolidated balance sheets. As such, unrealized gains and losses associated with the derivative instruments will be recognized into earnings in the same period during which the hedged assets and liabilities are recognized in earnings.

(2) Derivative instruments for hedging and hedged items
